Homily—Canon Douglas

On the Occasion of Honoring the Life of Canon Winfred Douglas Feast Day of the Transfiguration, August 4, 2013 Homily Given by The Reverend Sarah A. Berlin

On behalf of all the members of the Church of the Transfiguration I want to extend the warmest welcome to all of you who are visiting with us today. This is a dual celebration – for one, this Tuesday the 6 the Transfiguration (we just heard it in the Gospel) and we are honoring the

memory of Canon Winfred Douglas, whose name is prominent in the history of this Church and of Evergreen. He wasn't the first priest to conduct services on this property – that was Francis Byrne, but he was the priest who was able to establish St. Mark's as a permanent Mission Church and became its Vicar. He was the impetus behind the Evergreen Conference, originally was a place for retreats and training of clergy, as well as a summer camp. He is well known locally. But nationally and even internationally he is known for his musical abilities and genius. He was the editor of our 1940 Hymnal and contributed to the arrangement and composition of many Hymns and worship settings – some of which we are singing and hearing today. He had a passion for music to express adoration of God. "His aim was to supplant what he called 'skilled en

tertainers' with a 'pure musical worship, where the prayer will sing and the music will pray." We are singing one of my personal favorites today that he arranged – "Humbly We Adore Thee" during communion. It will give you the sense of music that prays. Great people such as Douglas received the faith and traditions of the church from their forbearers he used his God given gifts to expand the faith and ministry of this Church. And we in our turn receive it and become its faithful stewards and we will in turn entrust it to the next generation. I am so impressed with what the members of this congregation have treasured from the past and what they are creating for a new generation here on this campus. They have lovingly maintained the integrity and historical character of the They didn't paint Douglas Hall hot pink and put up a disco ball. They didn't tear down walls in St. Mark's – you can still see the spot where Douglas was ordained and stand in the very space where the first worship ser-🧱 vice was conducted in what had been the Stuart Hotel. Prayer is soaked into these walls. But on the other hand the good members of Transfiguration did not keep things frozen in time and adopt a "hands off" policy for the use of the buildings. Museums provide society an invaluable service to preserve historical artifacts. But the church is not a museum, although I've been in few that were. The church is a structure that supports a living, changing faith community and culture. Transfiguration ministers, not only to its members but to the community of Evergreen. We hear the patter of little feet on those original floorboards in St. Mark's and hear the laughter of children who attend our Episcopal Day School. They opened up a building on site for the Evergreen Christian Outreach Ministry. It is a place of healing for those who meet here for AA meetings. There is a beautiful labyrinth in the meadow. 

We just heard in the gospel the event that gave this church its name. Jesus was transfigured on the mountain. Somehow, Moses and Elijah were witness as well as the disciples who were understandably dumbfounded by the whole experience. We are given a great example in Peter of what not to do. He really spoiled the moment by blurting out the first thing on his mind without thinking first. When we are on Holy ground the best response is awe and silence. Peter had a tendency to say the darndest things and Jesus had to dust him back. I wonder how he felt this time when a voice came from the heavens and said: "Listen." Peter also wanted to makes this place on the mountain a shrine. He wanted to capture Moses and Elijah, build dwellings for them and remain happily ever after in this state of ecstasy. It would not be so. "On the next day when they had come down from the mountain, a great crowd met them." We cannot capture mountaintop experiences, we have to return and carry on with life. Come Monday morning we may find ourselves back in the rush of life. But, perhaps we have been fortified by our Sunday worship. Underneath our mundane activities we can feel a vigor and a trust and faith and Divine strength that underpins our day to day life and gives us eyes that see the beauty and goodness of God's creation despite all that is going on around us. We have something profound to tap into - God's Love. Peter serves as a great example to us about transfiguration. He, and we in our turn, have an endless opportunity to be transformed by Divine Love. Peter was constantly, putting his foot in his mouth, trying to be a big shot, he even denied our Lord before the crucifixion. How bad can it get. Thomas Keating writes of Peter that Jesus really named him Rocky - a nickname befitting his behavior. But after the resurrection and ascension, Peter did become the Rock on which the church was founded. He becomes forthright in the face of enemies. He becomes courageous. The man who usually said the wrong thing becomes an inspired witness to the faith of Jesus Christ. And in today's passage he clearly

has received Grace to regard his own impending death without fear. Transfiguration, it's not just a date on the church Calendar, to be celebrated, an event frozen in time. Transfiguration, transformation – they are very current realities. They are about moving forward in the life and power of the Resurrection of Christ. It's all there – choose life. And if it can happen to Peter I assure you it can happen to each and every one of us.

Thank you from Evergreen Christian Outreach.

This ministry in our mountain communities has fed hundreds of families and individuals. Our

neighbors have been able to shop weekly for nourishment not only for their bodies but for their spirits as well. It is seen daily.

A woman enters the main office for the first time having recently lost her job. She is greeted by a warm smile and welcoming words. After meeting with the Director of Client Services she is given a voucher to shop in the food bank. A volunteer in the food bank shows our new client the shelves which are organized by nutritional categories: protein, fruits, and vegetables and grains. Depending on the size of her family she takes the appropriate items from each area. As she fills her grocery bags a sense of relief overcomes her. Maybe she can make it through the coming week.

She still worries about how to prepare her young ones for the start of school. There are school supplies and new clothes available for her to select. All of these wonderful donations come from generous neighbors from the area churches such as yours and the surrounding communities.

Cathy, the Director of Client Services does not want to overwhelm our visitor on the first visit but prepares information for her explaining the EChO Jobs Program. A workshop will be offered on September 17 for people looking for jobs and a new class on Budgeting will be offered September 24th (this seems to be the top request of our clients). These workshops are open to community members as well. There is even a computer in the office that clients can use to look up job openings at www.echojobs.org.

A small smile appears and a big thank you is spoken as she leaves the EChO office. She has found a small space where her troubles are understood and can be shared with others.

The staff and volunteers at Evergreen Christian Outreach are striving to help those less fortunate to reach their true potential and gain self sufficiency during a hard time in their lives. 



September Garden Soup

- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 each medium onions, and carrots, thin sliced
- top third of 2 stalks celery with their leaves, thin sliced
- 6 cloves of garlic, thin sliced
- · salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 2 teaspoons each dry basil and sweet paprika
- 2 tablespoons tomato paste
- 2 medium zucchini, thin sliced
- a handful fresh spinach leaves, chopped
- 1 portobello mushroom, cap and stem washed and cut into 1/2-inch dice
- 1/2 of a large head green cabbage, chopped
- 6 to 8 cups broth (low-sodium vegetable or chicken broth)
- 1 1/2 cups (6 ounces) shredded Asiago or sharp cheddar cheese

In a heavy 6-quart pot, combine the olive oil, onions, carrots, celery, and garlic. Season with salt and pepper, cover, and cook over medium low heat 15 minutes, or until the vegetables are wilted and aromatic. Stir often and don't let anything burn.

Uncover, raise heat to medium high, blend in the tomato paste, and basil and paprika. Cook about 3 minutes. Add remaining vegetables and the broth. Bring to a simmer, partially cover the pot, and cook 30 minutes or until vegetables are tender and soup is full flavored. 3. Serve in deep bowls, sprinkling each portion with some of the cheese.


