

#### The Maltese Cross and Chiming Bells

The **Maltese Cross** cushion was donated by Gene Marcia Younger to honor their children, Gregory and Gwendolyn. It was stitched by Gerry Mangney and Kit Muire. **Chiming Bells** are a tall flower with a blue bell-shaped blossom that is pink at the base. When we moved here in 1964, and until we left in 1996, it grew everywhere, especially in ditches along the roads. The children would pick it on the way home from school, which we allowed them to do as long as they did not pull the plants up by the roots, and all summer our house had vases of wild flowers on the tables. When we returned in 2009, we did not see them anymore and I do not know why. The elk? Spraying? I miss them.

The **Maltese cross** is associated with the Knights of Malta, also known as the Knights of St. John, founded by Amalfitian merchants in about 1070. (Amalfi was an Italian republic of the 11<sup>th</sup> century.) The purpose of the order was to aid and care for pilgrims making the journey to the Holy Land, then under Moorish rule. In 1136, it became a fully militarized order, and was given the island of Malta as their sovereign land by Charles V of Spain in 1530. It is still of national symbol of Malta.

The eight points of the cross are believed to represent the eight vows taken by the knights: 1) live in truth 2) have faith 3)repent of sin 4) give proof of humility 5) love justice 6) be merciful 7) be sincere and whole hearted 8) endure persecution. Or it may represent the eight points of courage: 1) loyalty 2) piety 3) bravery 4) generosity 5) contempt of death 6) glory and honor 7) helpfulness to the sick and the poor 8) respect for the church.Or it may represent the eight Beatitudes.

This cross is the symbol of firefighters everywhere, because when the Knights of Malta fought the Saracens for possession of the Holy Land, they encountered for the first time a new weapon – fire. As they advanced upon the city, the knights were struck by glass bottles containing naphtha, and when they were saturated with the highly flammable liquid, the Saracens hurled flaming torches into their midst. Fire departments thus recognize the Knights as the first firefighters. The **Maltese Cross** is often confused with Nazi Germany's Iron Cross, which does not have the deep V cuts in the arms of the cross that form the eight pointed cross of the Knights of Malta.

### The Cross of St. James and the Indian Paintbrush

The **Cross of St James** cushion was donated by Edward and Harriett Hauk Stearns to honor her cousin Ernestine Block Grigsby, and it was stitched by Harriett Stearns. **Indian Paintbrush** is another flower that used to be common here. These we did not allow the children to pick as it was nearly impossible not to pull them up by the roots, and anyway they wilted almost at once.

The **Cross of St James** was the emblem of the 12<sup>th</sup> century Spanish Military Order of Santiago, named after St. James the Greater, patron saint of Spain. St. James is traditionally

supposed to have brought Christianity to Spain. The order was originally established to provide protection to pilgrims visiting the tomb of St. James, who were frequently harassed by the Moors. The vertical limb is pointed so that it can be driven into the ground, forming a cross in front of which its owner would kneel to pray. Thus it symbolizes taking up the sword in the name of Christ.

#### The Cross of St Andrew and the Harebell (Scottish Bluebell)

The **Cross of St Andrew** cushion was donated by Knox and Ruth Brookfield to honor Bob and Kay Millar, and was stitched by Ruth Brookfield. **Harebells** are tiny delicate intenselyblue flowers that although they seem to have disappeared in their wild form from Evergreen, can be cultivated nicely in a shady garden. Like the Indian Paintbrush, they wilt quickly after picking and are not suitable for indoor arrangements. They are associated with Scotland, as in the song *The Bluebells of Scotland*. Supposedly they are called harebells because they are found in meadows frequented by rabbits (hares).

The Cross of St. Andrew is a saltire; that is, a heraldic symbol in the form of a diagonal cross, as in the letter X. St. Andrew, younger brother of St. Peter, is said to have been martyred on such a cross at his own insistence, saying that he was not worthy to die in the same manner as Jesus. It appears consistently on coins of the Christian emperors of Rome, from the fourth century.

The Millars, in whose honor the Brookfield donated this cushion, were proudly Scottish, and this cross is associated with Scotland. The Scots claimed to be descended from the Scythians who lived on the shores of the Black Sea in what is now Rumania and Bulgaria, who were converted to Christianity by St. An-



drew. Legend says that in 832 A.D. King Angus the night before a battle with the Northumbrians dreamed that St. Andrew appeared to him and said that the next day he would see a Cross in the sky and would defeat his enemies. During the battle the next day, an X-shaped cross appeared in the sky during the battle, encouraging the Scots and causing the Northumbrians to flee the field. Thus as Scotland slowly became a nation it needed a symbol around which to rally, and St. Andrew was their choice.

 Please feel free to bring any finger foods to share---but most important, we would like to see you!


