Two guestions for Lent 1) Who is Jesus the Messiah? 2) What does it mean to me a faithful disciple of Jesus? After his baptism, Jesus spent 40 days in the desert asking himself, who he was as the Messiah. In those ancient days, a popular version of "Messiah", was a leader -ruler who would lead the Jews to conquer their enemy as King David did. No one expected Jesus to be suffering and dying Messiah. Yet this is precisely what Jesus teaches his disciples! After hearing rejection, suffering, death and resurrection, the disciples shut down. In fact, the disciples don't even hear resurrection, all hearing ceased after suffering and death. Yet that is clearly

what Jesus is teaching. This is what being the Messiah is for Jesus. The unacceptable is followed by the inconceivable. Peter, who had confessed to Jesus that he was the Messiah, now takes Jesus aside to rebuke Jesus. Peter may have said, "Rejection, suffering and death is not on the messiah agenda. Rather, prestige, power and might are on the agenda, Jesus! Jesus, we signed up for the Crown, not the Cross." Peter was blinded by his own preconceptions. So are we. We are equally blinded by our own presuppositions of how life should be. Jesus hears Peter out, but then in turn rebukes Peter – Peter is speaking for Satan – trying to turn Jesus away from the Cross to be another kind of Messiah. These were



the same temptations that Jesus had to deal with while in the desert for 40 days. These were the same temptations that Jesus had to deal with in the Garden of Gethsemane, asking his Father "to take this cup away from me", but eventually saying "Your will, not mine." This background of Jesus acceptance of "rejection, suffering, death and resurrection" leads from the Cross to the Crown. No Cross = No Crown. Yes, Cross = Crown. Jesus' rebuke is not just to Peter, but to all his disciples: deny yourself and come, follow me. Denying self has been a problem. As long as the self reigns, we will forever seek painless shortcuts to the kingdom. Only when we deny self and take up the Cross, can we enter into the Kingdom of God. This is true Discipleship. In the end, Messiahship and Discipleship are inextricably linked. When we finally accept Jesus for who he is, the suffering one, who lays down his life for others, then we can understand who we are to be, denying self, we can take up the Cross and follow him.

Finding Nouf, by Zoe Ferraris -- Paperback

When sixteen-year-old Nouf goes missing, her prominent family calls on Nayir al-Sharqi, a pious desert guide, to lead the search party. Ten days later, just as Nayir is about to give up in frustration, her body is discovered by anonymous desert travelers. But when the coroner's office determines that Nouf died not of dehydration but from drowning, and her family seems suspiciously uninterested in getting at the truth, Nayir takes it upon himself to find out what really happened. He quickly realizes that if he wants to gain access to the hidden world of women, he will have to join forces with Katya Hijazi, a lab worker at the coroner's office who is bold enough to bare her face and to work in public. Their partnership challenges Nayir and forces him to reconcile his desire for female companionship within the parameters imposed by his beliefs.

In The Heart Of The Sea, by Nathaniel Philbrick

The ordeal of the whaleship Essex was an event as mythic in the nineteenth century as the sinking of the Titanic was in the twentieth. In 1819, the Essex left Nantucket for the South Pacific with twenty crew members aboard. In the middle of the South Pacific the ship was rammed and sunk by an angry sperm whale. The crew drifted for more than ninety days in three tiny whaleboats, succumbing to weather, hunger, disease, and ultimately turning to drastic measures in the fight for survival. Nathaniel Philbrick uses little-known documents-including a long-lost account written by the ship's cabin boy-and penetrating details about whaling and the Nantucket community to reveal the chilling events surrounding this epic maritime disaster.

Me Before You, by JoJo Moyes

Louisa Clark is an ordinary girl living an exceedingly ordinary life—steady boyfriend, close family—who has barely been farther afield than their tiny village. She takes a badly needed job working for ex– Master of the Universe Will Traynor, who is wheelchair bound after an accident. Will has always lived a huge life—big deals, extreme sports, worldwide travel—and now he's pretty sure he cannot live the way he is.

Will is acerbic, moody, bossy—but Lou refuses to treat him with kid gloves, and soon his happiness means more to her than she expected. When she learns that Will has shocking plans of his own, she sets out to show him that life is still worth living.

Suite Francaise, by Irene Nemirovsky

Available: Kindle, paperback, library

Beginning in Paris on the eve of the Nazi occupation in 1940. *Suite Française* tells the remarkable story of men and women thrown together in circumstances beyond their control. As Parisians flee the city, human folly surfaces in every imaginable way: a wealthy mother searches for sweets in a town without food; a couple is terrified at the thought of losing their jobs, even as their world begins to fall apart. Moving on to a provincial village now occupied by German soldiers, the locals must learn to coexist with the enemy—in their town, their homes, even in their hearts.When Irène Némirovsky began working on *Suite Française*, she was already a highly successful writer living in Paris. But she was also a Jew, and in 1942 she was arrested and deported to Auschwitz, where she died. For sixty-four years, this novel remained hidden and unknown.

The Light Between Oceans, by M.L. Stedman

After four harrowing years on the Western Front, Tom Sherbourne returns to Australia and takes a job as the lighthouse keeper on Janus Rock, nearly half a day's journey from the coast. To this isolated island, where the supply boat comes once a season, Tom brings a young, bold, and loving wife, Isabel. Years later, after two miscarriages and one stillbirth, the grieving Isabel hears a baby's cries on the wind. A boat has washed up onshore carrying a dead man and a living baby.

The Nightingale, by Kristin Hannah

Available: Kindle, Hardcover, Used

FRANCE, 1939 -- In the quiet village of Carriveau, Vianne Mauriac says goodbye to her husband, Antoine, as he heads for the Front. She doesn't believe that the Nazis will invade France...but invade they do, in droves of marching soldiers, in caravans of trucks and tanks, in planes that fill the skies and drop bombs upon the innocent. When a German captain requisitions Vianne's home, she and her daughter must live with the enemy or lose everything. Without food or money or hope, danger escalates all around them.

All The Light We Cannot See, by Anthony Doerr

From the highly acclaimed, multiple award-winning Anthony Doerr, the beautiful, stunningly ambitious instant *New York Times* bestseller about a blind French girl and a German boy whose paths collide in occupied France as both try to survive the devastation of World War II.

Khirbet Khizeh, by S. Yizhar

Available: Paperback, used

Fiction. Translated from the Hebrew by Nicholas de Lange and Yaacob Dweck. Afterword by David Shulman. This classic 1949 novella about the violent expulsion of Palestinian villagers by the Israeli army has long been considered a high point in Hebrew literature, as it has also given rise to fierce controversy over the years. Published just months after the end of the 1948 war.

Redeployment, by Phil Klay

Phil Klay's *Redeployment* takes readers to the frontlines of the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, asking us to understand what happened there, and what happened to the soldiers who returned. Interwoven with themes of brutality and faith, guilt and fear, helplessness and survival, the characters in these stories struggle to make meaning out of chaos.

Master and Man, by Leo Tolstoy

Available: Kindle, Paperback, used

In "Master and Man", Tolstoy depicts an employer, bent on closing a business deal, travelling with his servant through the swirling snow - little realizing how soon he may have to settle his accounts with his maker.

The Goldfinch, by Donna Tartt

Available: Kindle, Paperback

Theo Decker, a 13-year-old New Yorker, miraculously survives an accident that kills his mother. Abandoned by his father, Theo is taken in by the family of a wealthy friend. Bewildered by his strange new home on Park Avenue, disturbed by schoolmates who don't know how to talk to him, and tormented above all by his longing for his mother, he clings to the one thing that reminds him of her: a small, mysteriously captivating painting that ultimately draws Theo into the underworld of art.

Katherine's Minestrone

- 2 T extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 2 medium carrots, peeled and diced
- 2 celery stalks, diced
- 1 large rutabaga, peeled & diced
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 1 teaspoon minced fresh rosemary
- 1 can (14.5 oz) diced tomatoes
- 1 1/2 cups cooked cannellini beans, drained and rinsed.
- 4 cups organic vegetable broth
- Piece of Parmesan cheese rind (optional but highly recommended!)
- 1/2 pound green beans, trimmed and cut into 1-inch pieces
- Small bunch of kale, stems removed and torn into bite-size pieces
- 1 ½ cups fresh or frozen peas
- 2 T fresh parsley leaves, chopped
- sea salt and freshly ground pepper
- Freshly grated Parmesan cheese, for serving

Directions

Heat oil in a large pot over medium heat. Add onion, carrots, celery, rutabaga, garlic, rosemary,
teaspoons sea salt and fresh pepper. Cook for 10 minutes, stirring occasionally, until the onions are golden.

2. Add tomatoes and simmer for 5 minutes.

3. While simmering, add broth and Parmesan cheese rind (if using) to the pot. Turn the heat to high and bring to a boil. Stir in the green beans.

4. Reduce heat to a simmer and cook 15 minutes. Add cannellini beans, kale and peas. Simmer for 5 more minutes. Stir in parsley. Add more sea salt and pepper to taste. Spoon out and discard the cheese rind. Then serve with grated Parmesan and drizzle of olive oil.






