



Soup Ministry

Homemade soups in the freezer are available for parishioners and friends that are sick, shut-in or need some TLC. Feel free to give soup to someone you see at church that is hurting, or take soup to someone you are going to visit. The soups are in the freezer on the east wall of the kitchen.

Jan's Chicken Soup 5 tablespoons fresh parsley finely chopped

1/2 teaspoon pepper

1/2 yellow onion, finely chopped

4 boneless, skinless chicken breast halves

5 chicken bouillon cubes

6 carrots, peeled and sliced

4 medium red potatoes, peeled and cubed

6 ounces fettuccine noodles

3/4 cups instant rice, uncooked



In a large stockpot combine the parsley, pepper, onion, chicken, bouillon cubes and 10 cups water. Bring to a boil and cook for about 30 minutes. Remove and reserve the chicken from the broth, then strain the broth into a large bowl. Discard the onion mixture. Allow the chicken to cool and cut into cubes.

Measure the broth and add water so that you have 8 cups of liquid in the large stockpot. Add the carrots and potatoes, bring to a boil and cook until the potatoes are done, about 20 minutes. Add the noodles and cook for 10 minutes more. Remove the pot from the heat and add the rice and reserved chicken. Stir the mixture and let it stand for 10 minutes before serving.

The Season of Easter

White is the color that symbolizes joy, purity, and truth. It is, therefore, the liturgical color for the seasons of Christmas and Easter.

Easter is the highest point of the church year and the Great Vigil is the first Eucharist of Easter. This is the most ancient liturgy of the church year. We go from death to life with Christ -- through fire, light, word, water, bread, and wine. We will kindle new fire, both physically and in our hearts. We shall light the great Paschal candle, and read the Bible by its light. In its light, we will offer prayer and praise. In the light, we will celebrate the Easter sacraments of baptism and Eucharist. We gather in tomb-like darkness and, suddenly, a flame is lit among us. This flame is the new first of Christ born among us in the midst of darkness. The paschal Candle, symbolizing the pillar of fire by which God led the Hebrews out of Egypt toward the promised land, is lit from the first and the celebrant processes into the Nave. The celebrant pauses three times to change, The Light of Christ, and three times the people respond, Thanks be to god. The people light individual candles from the Paschal Candle and the light spreads in the darkness among the congregation as we chant and read the Old Testament stories of God's deliverance from death and slavery. Then, with the first reading from the resurrection narratives, all the lights come on and we sing alleluias for the first time since the Epiphany season. Easter lasts 50 days and ends on the Day of Pentecost. During the fifty days of the Easter Season, the liturgical color is white and liturgies are uplifting and joyful. God has brought us full circle: from ashes into the fullness of life and joy. God does, indeed, have the final world. The Paschal Candle burns in the church near the font throughout Easter.


Estate Planning Workshop

The Episcopal Day School – Evergreen (EDSE) educates children and provides parent education. The Bell Tower Legacy Society (BTLS) promotes planned giving by parishioners. On April 22 these Transfiguration programs collaborated to offer a free estate planning workshop for EDSE parents, members of the parish and the community. EDSE Director Janet Resnick informed parents through backpack express (workshop information sent home with each child). Mary Haave, Bell Tower chair, secured Timothy Wilson, an attorney with the Sells Law firm in Evergreen, to present pro bono "Estate Planning Tips to Protect Your Growing Family." Mary spread the word by posting flyers on every known and some previously undiscovered bulletin boards throughout the community. Marketing Director Shelley Black placed an announcement in The Canyon Courier.

School parents, faculty, parishioners and community members received an engaging overview of estate planning unburdened by legal jargon. Mr. Wilson's presentation responded to the needs of young families, grandparents, those without wills and those with estate plans in place. Highlights for parents included such issues as guardianship and special needs trusts. For older attendees he covered elder law concerns and for those with wills a reminder to review and keep them current. Through this activity the church and school gained important community connections. Mr. Wilson learned Transfiguration's history from Senior Warden David Black and plans to return with his wife to walk the campus.




