# Sara's Potato Leek Soup

3 tablespoons butter, heated in large pot. Add 4 large leeks, including three inches of green, diced, and 2 large onions, diced. Season with salt and pepper and cook until soft. Add 2 cloves gar-



smashed, 3 sprigs thyme, and 1 bay leaf. Stir, pour in 2 quarts chicken broth. Bring to a boil, simmer 30 minutes. Add 3 medium potatoes, peeled and diced. Simmer 20 minutes or until soft.

Remove thyme and bay leaf. Purée with stick blender until roughly smooth or purée completely in a blender. Serve hot or cold.

#### Wildflowers and Crosses by Sara Gadeken

The **Jerusalem Cross**, symbol of Pentecost, and the **Creamy Cinquefoil** was donated by the women of Transfiguration to honor Charles Blakeslee, rector of Transfiguration from 1964 to 1984. It was stitched by Nan Banker. The Jerusalem Cross is also known as the Crusaders Cross, since it was the symbol assigned to the Crusaders by Pope Urban II during the first Crusade. The symbol may represent

Christ's command to preach the Gospel to all four corners of the earth, which is why it is associated with Pentecost. Other stories are that the five crosses represent Jesus and the four Gospel writers, or they may represent the five wounds suffered by Jesus on the cross, or they



could refer to the five nations involved in the First Crusade. The Creamy Cinquefoil, sometimes called the Sticky Cinquefoil, is a low-growing shrubby plant with yellow five-petaled flowers that grow all over Evergreen.

Father B, as we called Father Blakeslee, was for my husband Emil and for me all that a priest should be. He was the object of much criticism during his tenure, and indeed he had his faults, but I have never known a better man. When I thank God for my life, Father B and his wonderful wife Ann are right up there with my family as blessings I neither earned nor deserved. I honor his memory each time I see the kneeler, and I thank the women that made these kneelers possible.

The **Celtic Cross** with the **Red Wood Lily** was donated by Emil and Sara Gadeken to honor her father Emrys Gordon Jones. It was stitched by Sue Thomas and Sara Gadeken (mostly by Sue). The Celtic Cross, associated with Wales and Ireland, has a long and ambiguous history, with many conflicting legends about its origin. Pagans, often sun-worshippers, insist that the quartered circle is a universal symbol of the sun and belongs to British pre-Roman, pre-Christian, worship. Indeed the earliest examples show the cross contained inside the circle. The Irish says that when St. Patrick was shown a sacred standing stone marked with a circle symbolic of the moon goddess, he marked it with a cross through the circle and blessed it, making the first Celtic cross. Others suggest that emperor Constantine, who in the fourth



century made Christianity the official Roman religion, used as his emblem the cross within a laurel wreath, which evolved into the Celtic cross. Presentday Christians see the circle as representing the endlessness and timelessness of God's love, while the cross marks a specific point in time at which Christ offered himself for our redemption.

The **Red Wood Lily** is native to Colorado, as are all the flowers on the kneelers, but in over fifty years I have only seen it once, during an extremely wet summer, growing next to Upper Bear Creek in the Elk Management Area on Mount Evans. It is a protected species and cannot be picked under penalty of law.

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The Fleur-de-Lys Cross with the Wild Iris was donated by Emil and Sara Gadeken to honor Emil's mother Rosie Gadeken Kreychik, and it was stitched by Vayann Gray. It is adorned with lily petals at the arm-ends. In the Christian heritage, the lily represents chastity, innocence and purity, and is particularly associated with the



Virgin Mary. Yet the arm-ends also have the appearance of barbed fighting spears, and so this cross is part of heraldry, especially in France. As a Christian symbol, the three points of the arm-ends represent the Trinity; in heraldry they represent faith, wisdom and chivalry. Both the Celtic Cross and the Fleur-Lys Cross signify the ambiguities and contradictions of our faith – a virgin who gives birth, a being who is both God and man, life out of death, the eternalness of God and the temporal specificity of the Crucifixion, the soft gentle lily and the barbed fighting spear combined in one symbol.

Emil asked for the Wild Iris on his mother's kneeler because she had loved that flower so much. Living on a poor hill farm during the Great Depression, she could not afford to buy bulbs, of course, but she traded with her neighbors until their farm house in north-eastern Nebraska was surrounded with them in every color and shape. Wild iris used to bloom in profusion in Evergreen in wet areas such as the meadow across from the Alderfer farmhouse on Buffalo Park road. Now they are disappearing. They are also a protected species.

#### A Pastoral Message to the clergy and people of Colorado

"How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses help? Little children, let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action." – 1 John 3:17-18

Dear Friends,

I know you have seen the devastation left in the wake of the 7.8-magnitude earthquake that struck near Kathmandu, Nepal, on the morning of April 25. At last count the death toll has surpassed 5,000 people, with more than 10,000 injured. The United Nations has estimated that some 8 million people may be impacted, many of whom are unable to return to their homes, because their homes have been destroyed or are not safe to enter.

Complicating the relief and recovery efforts is the rough terrain and isolated nature of communities in Nepal and across the Himalayas. Communication is difficult, and the heavy rains that have moved into the area are intensifying hardships for people now sleeping and living out in the open.

Once again, we struggle with the realization that we control nothing, that ancient buildings and sacred sites can be reduced to rubble in moments, that lives can be changed in an instant, and that the work of relief, recovery and rebuilding will be slow and arduous.

I want you to know that Episcopal Relief & Development is working with the ecumenical ACT Alliance in Nepal and local partners in northern India and southwest China to respond to immediate needs for food, clean water and shelter, as well as the need for accurate information through on-the-ground assessment.

Episcopal Relief & Development is also in contact with the Anglican Diocese of West Malaysia regarding support for the work of the Deanery of Nepal, which is part of the Diocese of Singapore.

In response, I urge you to do several things:

1) The greatest gift we can offer is our deep prayer – our prayer for those who have died, for those who have been injured, for those whose lives have been turned upside down, for those who grieve the loss of friends and loved ones, the loss of homes and livelihoods, the loss of much they hold dear. Let us pray, too, for those who are bringing relief, support and encouragement to this stricken region.

2) In addition to our prayer, a tangible financial commitment to help those in need is called for. I am encouraging donations to the Nepal Earthquake Response Fund, to enable Episcopal Relief & Development to support its partners' emergency relief efforts in the region. 3) Please make this information available to your congregations, and encourage parishioners to commit to contributing generously to relief efforts. I am attaching information to this letter that you may include in your parish communications, and prayers that may be included in your worship services.

During this Easter season, let us remember that it is through our loving actions that Christ abides in us, and we in him. Let us put our love into action.
