St. Francis of Assisi

St. Francis of Assisi, continued

As soon as Francis got well, he informed his parents of his determination. They were disappointed. They became angry with Francis. Francis gave up his old ways and habits and set up to serve God. He distributed clothes, goods and money to the poor. His father was very much annoyed towards his son. He said, "Is this the gratitude you show to me? I laboured hard and amassed wealth. You are lavishly wasting it on these miserable wretches".

Francis' friends mocked at him and teased him. His father turned him out of the house. Francis lived like a beggar. His old friends even pelted him with stones and mud. He bore everything with patience. He wore a coarse dress and ate simple food.

Francis lived in a cave in the mountains of Assisi and spent his time in prayer and meditation for two years. Some kind people gave him food, but very often he had to starve.

Francis called the body 'brother ass'. He kept this brother ass under perfect discipline and control. Sometimes he kept this brother ass without food and water and denied it some special food that it liked very much.

Francis was humble. He loved God's creatures. He loved birds and beasts. He loved the depressed and the outcastes. He treated the birds, the beasts and all beings as brothers and sisters.

Francis went from village to village preaching the love of God. He invited people to join him in his life of service if they were willing. Bernard, a rich man of Assisi, was very much attracted by the saintliness of Francis. He joined Francis. He was the first follower of Francis. He placed all his wealth at the altar of God. Eleven others also joined Francis. They distributed all their wealth to the poor. Francis and his followers went all over Italy preaching, teaching, healing and blessing wherever they went.

The gospel of kindness and love of Francis soon spread all over Europe and earned for him the name of St. Francis. People called him the little poor man of Assisi. He lived for ever in the hearts of all men.

St. Francis collected many followers and founded the Order of Mendicant Friars or Franciscans. The members of this Order have to take a vow of poverty, chastity, love and obedience.

St. Francis gave up his mortal coil in 1228.

The followers of St. Francis built a beautiful church round him on the hill of Assisi, the hill he so dearly loved. The influence of St. Francis and the sweet aroma of the life he lived will last for ever.

Blessing of the Animals

In the Scriptures, the act of blessing means 'the imparting of power or life.' The person performing the blessing is mediating that power from God or Christ to the person performing or the animal involved. To bless is more than an expression of goodwill and caring. To bless is to impart God's power in person! The blessing of each animal, by name, means that health, healing and life are being mediated from God for the benefit of the animal in its relationship with its human partners. Be careful not to reinforce the separation of human animals and other animals by this blessing. Instead, consider reinforcing our common kinship by blessing ALL animals—human and otherwise.


Soup Ministry

EChO October soup—Pumpkin Soup

- 33 cups chicken stock
- 2 tablespoons and 2-1/4 teaspoons salt
- 22 cups pumpkin puree
- 5-1/2 cups chopped onion
- 2-3/4 teaspoons chopped fresh thyme
- 5-1/2 cloves garlic, minced
- 2-3/4 cups heavy whipping cream
- 28 whole black peppercorns
- 1. Heat stock, salt, pumpkin, onion, thyme, garlic, and peppercorns. Bring to a boil, reduce heat to low, and simmer for 30 minutes uncovered.
- 2. Puree the soup in small batches (1 cup at a time) using a food processor or blender. Return to pan, and bring to a boil again. Reduce heat to low, and simmer for another 30 minutes, uncovered. Stir in heavy cream.

The Discipline of Passion: Obeying the Mandates of Your Heart

When you sit on a porch swing, or have your first early morning cup of coffee, or take a hike in the mountains, where does your mind wander? What dreams do you hold of things you might have tried, things you might still like to try to do?

These questions are at the root of all meaningful ministry. The Good News comes to life through our passions made tangible in the world.

Tell me, what is it you plan to do with your one wild and precious life?

In this weekend, participants will work in small groups called "Passion Teams" using a combination of individual journaling, group conversation, mini-lectures, and other exercises. The purpose of this work is to unearth a dream or passion and then develop a plan to enact this dream in one's local context. The dream or passion can be as simple as organizing one's home office, or as broad as starting a new nonprofit to address an issue of concern.

The underlying assumption upon which this retreat is based is that some of the most effective ministry happens when Christians practice the discipline of listening to the passions we each have and acting on them.

Led by journalist and facilitator Darreby Ambler, you will begin a process Darreby pioneered with impressive results in her home state of Maine. You will work with a small group so that you can bring your dream to fruition over the six weeks following the retreat.

PLANNED GIVING

What is Planned Giving?

A planned gift is any gift made during a lifetime or under a will or other trust from assets accumulated during one's life.

The Ministry of Planned Giving:

- Is a ministry that encourages and assists church members to plan responsibly for the disposition of their wordly goods
- Encourages church members to make suitable provision for their family members while remembering the church as well
- Invites parishioners to witness to their faith, their love for God and the Church in a very special way
- Strengthens the ministry of the church, the institution, or the program to which parishioners have special commitment to support for generations to come

What are some Planned Giving Options?

Life Income or Residence Gifts

A. Pooled Income Fund

Cash or appreciated property. Current income tax deduction based on age of the donor and/or beneficiaries. Possible avoidance of capital gains tax on appreciated property. Stream of income for life to donor or beneficiaries. Possible estate tax savings.

B. Charitable Gift Annuity

Cash or appreciated property. Current income tax deduction. Income for life at fixed rate to donor or beneficiaries. Possible estate tax savings.

C. Life Estate

Gift of real estate: home, vacation home, farm, ranch or condominium. Current income tax deduction; no capital gains tax; possible estate tax savings. If income property, income stream can continue. Occupancy of property until death.

D. Charitable Remainder Trust

Cash or appreciated property. Current income tax deduction based on age of the donor and other factors. Initial bypass of capital gains tax. Fixed payout or % of assets in trust. Possible estate tax savings.

What are some Planned Giving Options?, continued

Simple Gifts Made During a Lifetime

A. Cash

Common, easy form of gift. Current income tax deduction.

B. Appreciated Property

Securities, real estate or tangible personal property such as automobiles, coins, etc. Typically, no capital gains tax paid on appreciation.

Gifts Made at Death

A. Bequest by Will

Cash or specific property. Simple to set up. Can be set amount, percent of estate, or a specific asset. Possible estate tax savings.

B. Life Insurance

Church is named as beneficiary of policy. Gift to church may be larger than otherwise possible. Possible estate tax savings.

C. Retirement Plan or IRA

Church is named beneficiary by the owner. Assets go directly to church, generally with no income or estate taxes due.

The above summary of planned giving options is meant only as an introduction, not a complete description. Parishioners interested in any of the above options should be urged to seek the counsel of their own legal and financial advisors in order to determine the suitability of the option in their individual situation. More information on the above options is available through the Foundation.




