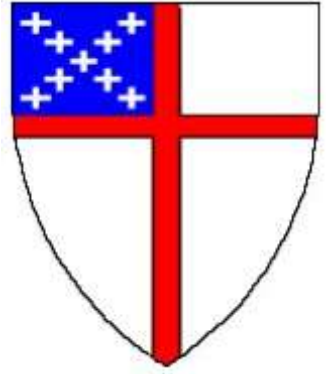

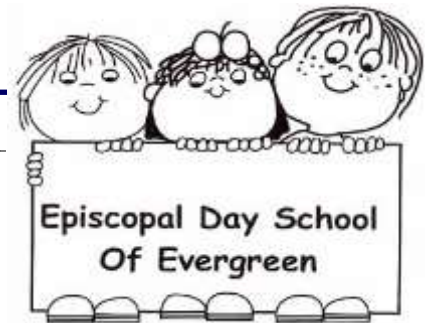

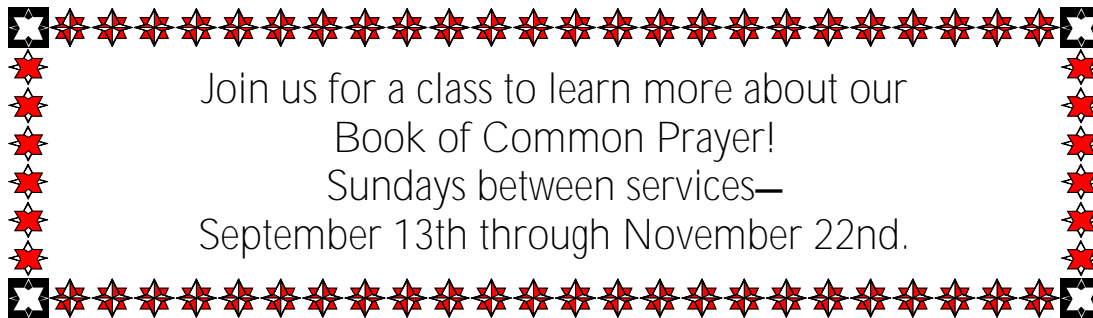

EChO Stone Soup

Vegetable Soup

INGREDIENTS

15 oz cannellini beans, drain + rinse
2 TBS olive oil
1 c onion, diced
1/2 cup carrots, diced
1/2 cup celery, diced
1.5 cup zucchini, peeled + diced
2 garlic cloves, minced
1 TBS fresh thyme, chopped
2 tsp fresh sage, chopped
1 tsp kosher salt
1/4 tsp fresh ground black pepper
32 oz chicken broth
2.5 oz rough chopped baby spinach
14.5 oz fire roasted, diced, tomatoes

DIRECTIONS

In a bowl mash half the beans with a masher and set aside.
Heat oil in a large soup pot {I use a large Le Creuset dutch oven} over med high heat. Add onion, carrots, celery, zucchini, garlic, thyme, sage, salt and pepper and cook for about 10 minutes until vegetables are soft. Add broth and tomatoes with their juice and bring to a boil. Add the mashed beans and whole beans and spinach and let simmer for 35-45 minutes over low heat. I topped the soup with little Parmesan + thyme toasted baguette slices that I put under the broiler for a couple minutes.

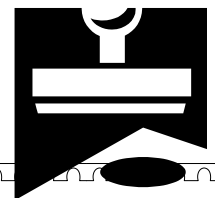

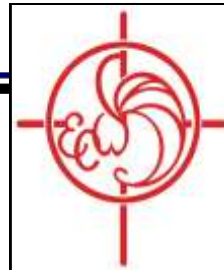

We have a most unusual church, with its many acres and twenty some buildings, and this is our chance to see them. We will not, of course, be able to enter the buildings in which people live, but we can learn about their history. Please join us.

President's Column:

Leading by Example

Many good people were responsible for ushering Episcopal Relief & Development into existence in 1940, but if one person qualifies for the title of founding father, it is the Rt. Rev. Paul Jones, a man whose life story of courage and resolve holds important lessons for us 75 years later.

A man of strong convictions, Bishop Jones was elected missionary bishop in Utah in 1914. He believed passionately in the Social Gospel's call to peace and justice, and opposed discrimination against African Americans and Jews. He even worked to allow the election of women as convocation officers — an idea decades ahead of its time.

Bishop Jones' rise coincided with the outbreak of World War I, and he did not hide his view that war was evil and that the United States should not get involved. After he spoke at an anti-war rally in 1917, the Bishop's Council demanded — and received — his resignation. Though he was a bishop for life, he had no diocese and was denied a vote in the House of Bishops.

Bishop Jones could have fallen prey to self-pity, anger or despair. Instead, he pursued his calling with as much vigor as ever. He directed the Fellowship of Reconciliation, an interfaith coalition for peace, and served as acting bishop of Southern Ohio. And he became the chaplain at Antioch College in Yellow Springs, Ohio, where he was voted the school's most popular professor and earned the moniker "Bishop to the Universe."

After the Nazis took power in Germany in the 1930s, Bishop Jones pushed his diocese to find ways to assist Jewish and other refugees and resettle them in America. At his impetus, the Diocese of Southern Ohio led the way for the entire Episcopal Church to embrace the cause of German refugees and launch the Presiding Bishop's Fund for World Relief, the original name for Episcopal Relief & Development.

Tragically, within a year of seeing his life's work come to fruition, Bishop Jones passed away from melanoma. But he did receive a measure of posthumous redemption. In 1991, the General Convention of The Episcopal Church asked the Standing Liturgical Commission to add Bishop Jones' name to its Church Calendar of Lesser Feasts and Fasts. September 4th, the date of his death, is now Bishop Jones' Day of Special Commemoration.

Whether or not one agrees with Bishop Jones' views, I think we can all find inspiration in the bravery and perseverance he displayed. He paid a fearsome price for following his conscience, yet he continued on undaunted.

And that is exactly the spirit we seek to capture today at Episcopal Relief & Development. Because the monumental task of healing a hurting world is never easy and is often fraught with setbacks. Success requires both passion and patience, both tenacity and adaptability, both courage of one's convictions and the capacity to listen. Above all, it requires the ability to keep charging boldly forward, just as Bishop Jones did.

As I reflect on the 75th anniversary of Episcopal Relief & Development, I'm also reminded that this is the 10-year anniversary of Hurricane Katrina — and my tenure as president. Throughout this past decade, our response to Katrina along the Gulf Coast — which continues to this day — reinforces the importance of persistence in all of our work. And it certainly is a quality I have sought to bring to my service at the helm of this remarkable organization.

All of us owe a debt to Bishop Jones, and all of us can repay it by upholding his great legacy, especially during our 75th anniversary year. That's certainly what I will seek to do as we keep moving forward on the path to healing a hurting world.

The Stewardship Corner, Ted Terry, Stewardship Board Chair



Welcome to the first edition of a regular feature of The Good News. Each month, a member of the Stewardship Board will write an article about Stewardship. Why every month? Who is on the Stewardship Board? Why is there a whole "Board", anyway? Good questions: that's why I asked them.

The Board is made up of people responsible for leading the various areas of stewardship at Transfiguration. Other members of the parish are part of the subcommittees, and the subcommittees welcome volunteers.

The leaders and their respective responsibilities are:

Mary Haave: Stewardship of Estate is focused on all areas of stewardship in preparation for our eventual departure from this earth. This includes leading the Bell Tower Legacy Society (for estate gifts and memorials), but also focuses on helping parishioners prepare for their own death with the goal of making it as easy as possible for our loved ones.

Michael Herrick: Stewardship of Environment has responsibility for ensuring we as a community are thoughtful about how we are using the resources God has given us. This includes developing programs to make it easier for us as a community to be responsible environmental stewards.

Jean LaFond & Mychelle Mowry: Stewardship of Treasure coordinates the annual pledge campaign in the Fall and communications regarding the importance of giving financially (and in other ways) as a way of giving back to God, not just as a way for the parish to balance its budget.

David Beard: Stewardship of Time & Talent is responsible for encouraging participation in our parish life and for matching ministries of interest to individuals and current and potential church programs and activities.

Additionally, Fr. Mike and I are on the board.

The Board believes that Stewardship is a constant in our lives. Every waking minute of every day we are making decisions regarding stewardship. From the large actions of how we donate of our time and our money, to the smaller decisions of how we are spending our time and money on everyday things. We believe that thinking of stewardship in terms of how we make decisions with regard to our assets (time is an asset,

possibly the most scarce for the people in our community) is a constant process and deserves continued discussion to spur the thoughtfulness required to match one's values with one's actions. We believe stewardship should be an element of the thought process of what one does with time and money.

Beginning this month, you will begin to see stewardship activities for the 2015-16 program year. We will highlight Time & Talent in September and the ministries the parish currently has. In October, pledging season will begin. In early 2016, we will focus on Stewardship of Estate. Stewardship of Environment will implement new programs throughout the year. During the program year, the stewardship message will focus on what the board believes is where we are as a faith community as we enter the second year with Fr. Michael as a full-time rector. This message will be based around the "Three Rs":

Rebirth: as dormant programs are reborn.

Renewal: as existing programs are reenergized.


Responsibility: as everyone takes a role in making Transfiguration a vital parish that supports each other and the community.

We are excited about helping make stewardship a value that is in all of our hearts and on all of our minds every day, not just pledging day.

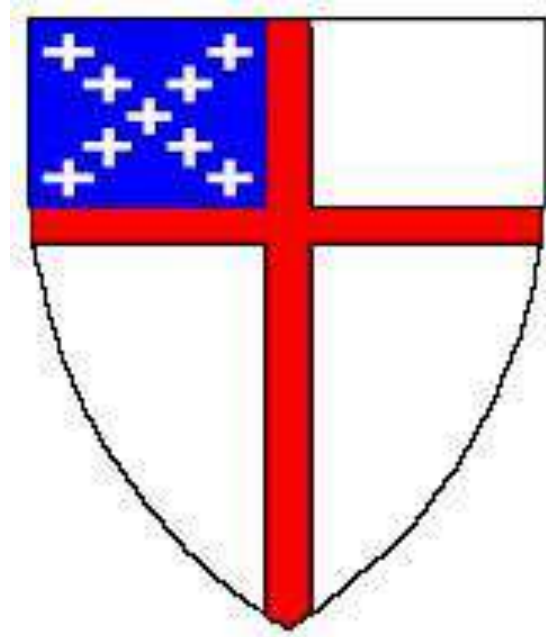
