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The Annunciation of Our Lord Jesus Christ

In the first chapter of Luke we read how the angel Gabriel announced to Mary that she had been chosen to be the mother of the Christ, and how Mary answered, "Here I am, the handmaid of the Lord. Let it be to me as you have said." It is reasonable to suppose that Our Lord was conceived immediately after this. Accordingly, since we celebrate His birth on 25 December, we celebrate the Annunciation nine months earlier, on 25 March. For many centuries most European countries took 25 March, not 1 January, as the

day when the number of the year changed, so that 24 March 1201 was followed by 25 March 1202. If you had asked a Christian of that time why the calendar year changed so awkwardly partway through a month, he would have answered: "Today we begin a new year of the Christian era, the era which began X years ago today when God was made man, when He took upon Himself a fleshly body and human nature in the womb of the Virgin."

MIRACLES, by C S Lewis.

...one of those features of the Christian story which is repulsive to the modern mind. To be quite frank, we do not at all like the idea of a "chosen people". 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

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Church Kneelers by Sara Gadeken

The lovely kneelers that grace our altar were dedicated to the Glory of God on June 2, 1985. They were a gift to the church from the Women of Transfiguration, who offered their time, talent and treasure to stitch these works of art. Each kneeler displays a different cross and a different wild flower that is native to Evergreen, as well as the names of the donor or donors, the name or names of those to whom the kneeler was dedicated, and the name or names of those who stitched it. Everyone involved in this project to whom I have spoken remembers it as one which brought the women of the church together in a mutual and prayerful exercise of commitment and joy. We did it together, it will last a hundred years, and it is beautiful.

In 1984, Dr. Robert Shattuck, a member of Transfiguration, needlepointed a beautiful wedding kneeler for the church. Soon after, Ruth Brookfield conceived the idea of the women of the church making an entire set of kneelers to replace the rather ordinary velveteen ones then in use. She researched the crosses and the flowers. Harriet Stearns painted the flowers and was the designer/ consultant on the project. Harriet Anderson, now Harriet Sear, coordinated the training of the stitchers, whose ability ranged from expert (lots of these) to rank beginner (me). She also supervised the stitching, kept track of materials, and in general kept the project moving forward. When the stitching was finished, Sue Thomas did the binding, Nan Banker the back stitching, and Lee Ball and Jean Hane the blocking. Harriet Anderson Sear, Delia Roberts, and Sue Thomas were in charge of the finish inspection

At Harriet's insistence, each of us, before we began on the kneeler itself, completed a small (9 inch by 9 inch) sampler with a flower in the center and a Jerusalem Cross (a larger cross surrounded by four small ones) in the corner. Only when we had successfully proven ourselves on the small piece could we begin a kneeler. Some who donated a kneeler also stitched it; some were stitched by others. Two were donated by the Women of Transfiguration to honor our recently retired rector Charles Blakeslee and his wife Ann.

We did most of the work at home but we also met regularly at Ruth Brookfield's to display our progress, to ask or offer help, and to talk about our lives.

Each month, the newsletter will feature some of the kneelers. Jean Hane, still a member of the congregation, stitched this month's selection. At present, it is on the far right of the Epistle Side (the right as one faces the altar). Walter and Jean gave this piece to honor his mother, Mary Catherine Hane. It shows the Cross of Passion (Lent), whose pointed edges recall the suffering of Christ, and the Golden Banner flower. Jean was inspired by Dr. Shattuck as well by this project to ask Harriet Stearns to design another wedding kneeler, which she stitched and then gave to her Lutheran church in Ohio in memory of her parents. This was an enormous project, and whenever I see the kneelers, I remember the sense of shared purpose, the joy of creating in community with other women, and I thank with all my heart the many women who made it possible.

at once that Christianity makes no concessions to this point of view. It does not tell of a human search for God at all, but of something done by God for, to, and about Man. And the way in which it is done is selective, undemocratic, to the highest degree. After the knowledge of God had been universally lost or obscured, one man from the whole earth (Abraham) is picked out. He is separated (miserably enough, we may suppose) from his natural surroundings, sent into a strange country, and made the ancestor of a nation who are to carry the knowledge of the true God. Within this nation there is further selection: some die in the desert, some remain behind in Babylon. There is further selection still. The process grows narrower and narrower, sharpens at last into one small bright point like the head of a spear. It is a Jewish girl at her prayers. All humanity (so far as concerns its redemption) has narrowed to that.

The following quotation is from Martin Luther's sermon "On the MAG-NIFICAT" (the Song of Mary, Luke 1:46-55).

"For He that is mighty hath done great things for me, and Holy is His Name." (Luke 1:49). The "great things" are nothing less than that she became the Mother of God, in which work so many and such great good things are bestowed upon her as pass man's understanding. For on this there follows all honor, all blessedness, and her unique place in the whole of mankind, among whom she has no equal, namely, that she had a child by the Father in Heaven, and such a child.

She herself is unable to find a name for this work, it is too exceedingly great; all she can do is break out in the fervent cry: "They are great things," impossible to describe or define. Hence men have crowded all her glory into a single word, calling her the Mother of God.

thing greater of her or to her, though he had as many tongues as there are leaves on the trees, or grass in the fields, or stars in the sky, or sand by the sea. Where is the "Alleluia"??

The association of alleluia with Easter led to the custom of intentionally omitting it from the liturgy during the season of Lent, a kind of verbal fast which has the effect, not of depressing the mood of the liturgy, but of creating a sense of anticipation and even greater joy when the familiar word of praise returns. Indeed, when the alleluia does return, it is with an incredible flourish. Before the proclamation of the Gospel at the Great Vigil of Easter, alleluia is sung to an exceptionally elaborate tone. It is a moment of unrestrained fervor as a singer intones the elaborate alleluia, and the congregation sings it back. The cantor raises the pitch and sings the alleluia a second time, and again the congregation echoes it back. Once more, the cantor raises the pitch, and the congregation responds. And then the good news is proclaimed that Christ is risen from the dead. The dramatic effect of the return of the alleluia is heightened considerably by the fact that no alleluias have been heard since Lent began.



Anointing and Healing Prayers





In order to inaugurate the *alleluia* fast, the custom arose of "burying the *alleluia*" before Lent begins as a reminder that we do not use it at all during the forty days of Lent. We do not use it at church. We do not use it at home. We let it rest, as it were, during Lent, so that when it reappears on Easter, we may hear it afresh. In fact, once it returns on Easter, we give it no rest at all, repeating it again and again, in celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus. There are various ways to "bury the *alleluia*." Here is one that combines this custom with a popular Easter custom. The *Alleluia* Egg is designed to help us bury the *alleluia* during Lent and to put *alleluia* in our midst during Easter.


